Message from the Prime Minister

It is indeed an honour for Barbados to have been chosen as the venue for this 37th Annual Congress of the International Association of Art Critics. Barbados, though one of the world's smaller nations, can boast of having an extremely rich and dynamic culture, and many of our artists, including of course, our Visual Artists, have, over the years, gained international recognition. Government is very much aware of the fact that this success has the potential to be translated into a significant source of national revenue, and to this end, I have recently established a Task Force to advise on the development and sustaining of Cultural Industries. Perceptions of Popular Art, artistic growth in small developing states, the role of the relevant institutions - are all issues which are crucial to artistic development in the Caribbean.

The Southern Caribbean chapter of the AICA, working with other cultural entities will take full advantage of opportunities presented by the presence of a Congress of this magnitude. Among the projects undertaken by AICA Southern Caribbean has been the production, in collaboration with the National Cultural Foundation and the National Art Gallery Committee, of a CD-ROM Database of Contemporary Visual Arts in Barbados. These agencies must be commended for this initiative, for this CD-ROM will be a major contribution to the widest dissemination of information on Barbadian art.

For those of you who are visitors to Barbados, I invite you to take the opportunity to explore our island while you are here. Experience true Barbadian culture first hand - not just the visual arts, but our music, our beaches, our food, and, of course, the warmth and dynamism of our people. I wish you every success in your Congress.

The decision to hold the congress jointly in Barbados and Martinique reflects one of the central goals of this regional chapter — that is, to foster collective, developmental interaction among visual arts communities throughout the Caribbean. The inclusion in our program of exhibitions from Guyana and Haiti, both curated by AICA Southern Caribbean members, is an important contribution to this initiative. This year's precongress tour, organized by AICA Dominican Republic, extends the scope of experiences available to participants and we are very glad for this opportunity to collaborate with our colleagues in Santo Domingo.

'Repositions — Repossessions' was chosen as the theme for this year's congress because of its relevance to the situation in the Caribbean, as well as to other developing regions of the globe. The production and promotion of art outside traditional 'art-centres', both geographical and institutional with an attendant critique of structures of evaluation and valuation is a central concern. But in a world of heightened instability and uncertainty, the need to adopt an ongoing responsive repositioning, a state of nomadic enquiry, becomes universal. The diversity of experiences which this year's program of feature speakers and presenters brings to the congress attests to this.

The challenges of organizing an event such as this are particularly acute for a young chapter divided among a number of countries with limited resources. The support of our sponsors has been immensely encouraging and we thank them. I would like to thank the members of AICA Southern Caribbean and particularly our executive members, Nick Whittle (General Secretary), Dominique Brebion (Vice President) and Alissandra Cummins (Treasurer), as well as the organizing committees in Barbados and Martinique under the direction of Nick and Dominique respectively. Their commitment to the realization of this congress is a testament to their personal dedication to the development of art and criticism in the region, as well as their skilled professionalism.

Since its establishment in 1997, the main focus of AICA Southern Caribbean has been on creating a forum which encourages a wide range of debate for the exchange and sharing of differing philosophies concerning the interpretation of the visual arts produced in the Caribbean. To this end we have organised two very successful symposia, "Fashioning a Language Forming a Dialogue" hosted by Barbados in 1998 and "Migration and Diaspora in Caribbean Art" held at the University of Central Florida during August, 2001.

The 37th AICA Congress held in Barbados and Martinique should be seen within the context of the preceding symposia; it does not represent a culmination but a continuum of debate.

Our programme is an exciting one and once it is over we shall start work on the publication of the Congress Proceedings.

We have commissioned a range of parallel activities to the Congress which include local and regional exhibitions together with a schedule of visits to artists' studios and collections.

The realisation of this Congress would not have been possible without the generous support of our local, regional and international sponsors.

Finally, I would like to thank all those who have worked unceasingly to ensure the success of the 37th AICA Congress in the Caribbean.

Themes of the Congress

The themes proposed for this congress invite participants to rethink what art is and what art does. This challenge has particular relevance to the Caribbean - a region which has traditionally been marginalized, exoticized or ignored by larger, urban developed art centres. Its history of confluences of indigenous American, European, African and Asian cultures under colonialism, and the subsequent post-modern penetrations of tourism and mass media provide a hybrid model of a phenomenon found throughout the globe. The theme of 'Repositioning' speaks to the production and promotion of art outside traditional 'art-centres', referring both to geographical and institutional locations. Proposing, establishing, recognising new positions, both physical and intellectual, necessitates an attendant repositioning or repossession of power.

1. PUBLIC ART / POPULAR ART

During this session the focus will be on the interaction of art and people. This will be addressed from two perspectives: art – both official and unofficial – in public spaces; and popular art – alternatively identified as outsider art, intuitive art etc.

An event such as Carnival provides only one example of the intersection of these two sub-themes.

2. ARTISTIC GROWTH IN SMALL / DEVELOPING COMMUNITIES

This session will identify and address the challenges faced by artists, critics and institutions who are working for the development of visual culture in small and/ or developing countries. Economic, political, technical restrictions; the impact of tourism; cultural marginalisation are some of the areas of concern.

3. THE INSTITUTIONS - THE CURATOR - THE CRITIC

Cultural foundations, national museums, commercial galleries, biennials, art journals, international funding agencies and the economics, personalities, motivations, justifications that sustain them. This session will address the necessity, development and impact of these entities – how they respond to, stimulate, validate, manipulate, segregate various aspects of visual culture.


